A question was raised by a member of the public: How will unitary status for Suffolk affect our town council?

The Town Clerk replied: This is a white paper so it is just an expression of what the government would like to do and doesn't directly involve town councils. Strategic authorities would need to have a directly elected mayor of that authority. As strategic authorities would be given extra powers the government thinks there needs to be a named person who holds these extra powers and who cannot be stopped by councillors from getting on with their job. This mayoral role is unrelated to mayors of town councils, who have no power to act alone.

It's been a challenging year but as this one ends I would like to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and the very best for the New Year.

1. Suffolk County Council News

Cabinet approves bold new vision for Suffolk's future

Suffolk County Council's Cabinet has today approved ambitious new plans to position Suffolk as a national leader in sustainable growth and innovation.

Suffolk Regiment archives available to view at West Suffolk House

Historical records charting more than 270 years of active service for the Suffolk Regiment have found a new home thanks to support from two councils.

Suffolk's rural communities hit by loss of £3 million in Government funding

£3 million of vital public funding - designed to support rural communities in Suffolk - will be cut by the government next year, it has been revealed.

Department for Education welcomes SEND improvements and evidence of impact, but recognises challenges. The Department for Education (DfE) met with senior leaders from Suffolk County Council and the NHS to review the impact of wide-ranging improvement plans for special educational needs and disabilities services (SEND).

2. Anti-Spiking Project

Pc Jack Oakley approached me in June about launching an anti-spiking initiative in Haverhill. Funding provided by Cllr

Roach and myself enabled PC Oakley to buy <u>'Stop Topps'</u> for pubs in town. Stop Topps are used to cover any drinking vessel used in pubs and clubs, including cans, bottles and glasses, to prevent spiking.

Nationally this campaign is designed to encourage people to consider their own safety when having a night out and taking positive action to prevent the risk of their drinks being spiked. Timed with the coming Christmas period, this a great opportunity to raise awareness about this growing concern. Whilst not a particular issue in Haverhill, it is in Cambridge. The Royal Exchange and The Woolpack have put up 'Stop Drink Spiking' posters from Suffolk Police, which includes a QR code taking users to a site to report drink-spiking incidents.

Many thanks to Brian and Dionne for running this scheme at the Royal Exchange and The Woolpack. (Please note all town centre licenced premises were asked whether they wanted to participate)

3. Changes to Winter fuel Payment - project with REACH, Citizens Advice and the Link

The 'Just about Managing this winter' leaflet was launched last week , as part of a joint campaign I have been involved with in partnership with REACH Citizens Advice and The Link. The hope is that we can reach pensioners who may be experiencing financial hardship, following changes to the winter fuel payment, and guide them towards support. I helped by funding the leaflet using SCC locality funding.

Its difficult to get the message out there about eligibility for different benefits and the support available for people who feel daunted by the application process. I have been very public at Cabinet and West Suffolk Council that more could be done to communicate what benefits and support is available. Posters will be distributed to key places around town and leaflets are available from REACH if you have an area you would like to target.

4. Haverhill's new recycling centre & the old Chalkstone Way site

I have received word that the old Chalkstone Way site will be retained by SCC for use as a renewing/reusing facility.

5. Highways

Winter & Potholes

Winter is obviously here, which can see road surfaces deteriorate. I kindly ask all ward members and members of the public to report road defects using the <u>Suffolk Highways Reporting Tool</u> for all defects to be assessed. Clearly Highways Maintenance Operational Plan will prioritise due to severity, but any help, particularly with the more serious road defects will help immensely.

Resurfacing work £10m Road Improvement project

Bad weather and hold ups have impacted some of the work planned.Harrow rd has had two failed attempts due to abandoned cars preventing work being done.

All work that has been identified for improvement will be carried out, though it is difficult to predict when due to the quantity of rescheduling that has taken place.

Haverhill Town Centre Signs

After a lot of "Toing and froing" behind the scenes at Highways, I have managed to secure an agreement that the TRO issue on the high Street will be resolved. This was confirmed to me on Thursday 12th Dec. As TRO's take a while to deliver, I have been tentatively informed that this and the Ehringshausen way Delivery Bay will form part of a package of issues expected to be delivered in April 2025. Again, thanks to Cllr Burns for his valued contributions.

Please note the following correspondence I have received regarding the High Street Signage: "I am very pleased to be able to report that the continued shaking of the proverbial tree has at last yielded a positive outcome – and that it has been confirmed that this TRO had been missed in the earlier consolidation order. This has been included in the list of 'anomalous' or otherwise 'missing' Traffic Regulation Orders that our Licensing Team are drawing together to commission a blanket order to further consolidate the Civil Parking Enforcement update (the same blanket order that will also address the Ehringhausen Way loading bay TRO). There is currently no timescale for these – but it is hoped that they will be in place by Spring 2025.

I appreciate this has been a very arduous process, but I am pleased that we have at last broken the deadlock here and achieved the desired outcome."

Greenfields Way Bus Stop & dropped kerbs

The bus shelter is ordered and the dropped kerbs funded by Cllr Roach are now with Milestone to schedule.. I don't have a date. It is likely there may be a delay, certainly on the dropped kerbs, as Milestone try to get through quite a weighty list of Councillor Projects as we near the end of this Council's term.

6. Persimmon Estate and Relief Road & S106 & Related

I am expecting a further update from Persimmon on a range of issues. I will share with members when it comes through. However, since my last report I have visited the Persimmon site to discuss a wide range of issues. I conducted a site visit a fortnight ago and raised concerns relating to a wide range of issues, many of which have been addressed in their December community update whichI distributed to councillors and I have added as an Addendum to this report.

I have been assured again that the relief Road is on target for a Spring 2025 opening. I remain sceptical yet also hopeful. I believe there is a keen determination to get this work completed. I am quietly working behind the scenes with West Suffolk and Highways to ensure that close monitoring of progress is being carried out;.

Of particular note I have been responding to multiple complaints regarding Sunday Working and excess amounts of mud on phase 6 roads and on Ann Suckling Road. I have received assurances that these issues are being dealt with. It would appear the Sunday working issue is now resolved. I believe the mud issue is ongoing and I am seeking further assurances about regular, multiple road cleaning that needs to take place each week.

Farrant Rd – No further progress. Persimmon are now instructing Contractors. They have stated completion by the end of the year. It is likely this will now be done in the new year.

Howe Road Bus Gate No - further update - Awaiting confirmation of Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) camera could take months as this link will not be open for many month. No timescales available for this.

Wratting Rd Puffin Crossing No further update.

Saxon Crescent Dopped Kerb and other Issues on Saxon Crescent - Expected to be installed very soon, subject to the developer booking road space. As these are works planned after the site had been signed off and there is no bond, there is little pressure that can be brought to bear to get it done quickly. I am chasing Highways to keep the developer on task. This slow delivery is most frustrating and the current situation in my opinion is unsafe for pedestrians with pushchairs wanting to cross Anne Sucking Rd.

7. Biodiversity and Community Orchard – Glebe

This is now completed. I funded two areas for increased biodiversity at the Glebe using SCC locality funding to helping solve an anti-social behaviour issue concerning residents. Plants used will attract pollinators and as it mature should make an appealing addition to the area. I have now had confirmation that the Community Orchard will now not go ahead.

8. Anaerobic Biodigester

No update. Still awaiting documentation from Acorn to be submitted.

9. Market

I remain concerned regarding the weekly saturday market. Individual events seem well attended such as the Christmas Event on the High street on the 29th November

10. Stour View Medical Centre & HSBC Bank

No further news on HSBC bank which is frustrating.

As regards the Stour View Medical Centre

"In July we acquired the freehold of Stourview Medical Centre in Haverhill to help facilitate future development on the Jubilee Place area, meet the ambitions of the town masterplan and provide the opportunity to deliver some of the place-shaping proposals. As we undertook to do at the time of purchase, we have sought to let out the property and I am pleased to report that the centre has been and continues to be used as a Covid and Flu Vaccination Clinic. Operated by Clare Pharmacy this has helped to provide a well-located vaccination service, close to the high street, for the residents of the town and the surrounding area. With the vaccination centre ending its Council – 17 December 2024 – COU/WS/24/026 term this Christmas, we are working with partners in the Health System to bring forward uses for property to the benefit of Haverhill and the town centre." 11. West Suffolk Council News

West Suffolk Council is on Tuesday 17th Dec.

"New housing targets are challenging but the right thing to do"

The Cabinet members for Housing and Planning at West Suffolk Council have welcomed increased targets for new homes saying it will be a challenge but it's the right thing to do.

Continuation of Council Tax reduction for those on low incomes recommended

Families in West Suffolk on low incomes, including those in work, suffering from economic hardship could benefit for another year from a 100 per cent discount in Council Tax.

West Suffolk Cabinet recommended continuing the discount for a third year following a consultation with the public and stakeholders which together supported extending the current Council Tax Reduction Scheme.

Council to discuss weed treatment in council managed land and assets

A decision to reinstate the controlled use of a weed treatment in limited areas to help reduce unwanted growth in hard landscaped areas and deterioration to structures, will be decided by Council next week.

Members will address the increasing challenge of invasive and unsightly weeds and unwanted growth in public areas, in and around manmade structures, where other methods have failed to work effectively. Evidence shows that the limited use of chemical weed treatment in discrete areas, would cause no measurable harm to the environment and help maintain a more attractive streetscape for residents and visitors who had complained about untidiness previously.

West Suffolk opens £34,000 fund to boost community sports activity

Grassroots sports clubs across West Suffolk can now apply for grants from a £34,000 council fund designed to increase participation and activity.

Home energy efficiency voucher scheme launched across homes in Suffolk

The Suffolk Retrofit Assessment Voucher Scheme, a pioneering initiative aimed at promoting energy efficiency and sustainability in homes across the county, has now been launched.

Addenda

Motions to Council (PASSED)

Motion 1 – Proposed by Councillor Matthew Hicks and seconded by Councillor TJ Haworth-Culf

'Suffolk County Council places on record its opposition to the changes to Agricultural Property Relief (APR) announced by the Labour government in the Autumn Budget. The Council believes that these changes create a 'Family Farm Tax', which fundamentally undermines the viability of Suffolk's farming sector and threatens our nation's food security.

Following these changes to APR, the Council reaffirms its support for Suffolk's meat, dairy and arable farmers. The Council notes analysis by the National Farmers Union (NFU) stating that 75 percent of working farms could be threatened by the 'Family Farm Tax' and that the average size of a Suffolk farm is 400 acres.

Furthermore, the Council registers its concern that the Labour government's policy of decarbonising the electricity grid by 2030, rather than 2035 under the prior government, threatens Suffolk's best and most versatile farmland, its rural communities and landscape.

National Grid's Transmission Entry Capacity (TEC) Register reveals that tens of thousands of acres of solar farms have been given connection offers in Suffolk. The Council notes that it is the position of the County Council that solar farms should not remove our best and most versatile land from food production.

The Council believes that the government's 2030 target is a driver towards the unnecessary industrialisation of Suffolk's landscape and does not allow sufficient time for the proper exploration of alternatives to schemes such as the Norwich to Tilbury Pylons and other energy projects elsewhere in the county.

Therefore, this Council resolves to:

a. Write to the Rt Hon Rachel Reeves MP and the Rt Hon Ed Miliband MP setting out its opposition to the polices above;

b. Invite representatives from Suffolk NFU to meet with the Leader and Deputy Leader of the Council to discuss how the Council can further support local farmers.'

Amended Motion 2 – (PASSED)

Initially proposed by Councillor Andrew Stringer (Green) and seconded by Councillor Richard Rout (Conservatives) 'Energy Secretary Ed Miliband has promised to triple the amount of solar power in the UK by 2030, including a 'rooftop solar revolution' to encourage builders and empower homeowners to install solar panels on new and existing buildings.

This council recognises Suffolk will have a role to play in reaching the government target of 70GW of solar capacity by 2035, and renewable energy has the potential to reduce residents' energy bills. However, current planning policy as applied by the planning inspectorate, Secretary of State and an uncoordinated approach to Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs) are creating significant challenges for our rural communities, including solar farms.

This council will welcome consultations that would ensure that solar installations are "roof before rural", as many communities feel that East Anglia is seeing too much of our most productive and valuable land set aside for solar farms without clear community benefit, while too many new buildings are allowed to be constructed without the benefits of solar generation. There also needs to be a clear plan to retrofit existing buildings to take most advantage of the opportunities our towns and urban areas present.

This council believes that insufficient consideration is currently being given to upgrading the local electricity distribution grid to enable rooftop and brownfield solar schemes, such as over car parks.

Furthermore, the council registers its concern that steps taken to date by the government and the solar industry to remove links to modern day slavery, particularly Uighur forced labour camps in Xinjiang, from the solar supply chain are insufficient and unacceptable

This council agrees to write to the Secretary of State to outline these concerns, and to seek assurances that our best quality agricultural land is protected by ensuring existing and future developments play their part in reaching our sustainable energy targets.

This council will also a) continue to review its own buildings and assets to facilitate the installation of rooftop solar panels wherever practical, , including libraries, family hubs and buildings on county farms. b) work through Suffolk Public Sector Leaders to ensure any such installation by local authorities in Suffolk have the best possible supply chain guarantees.'

Motion 3 – Proposed by Councillor Sam Murray and seconded by Councillor Philip Faircloth-Mutton (PASSED) 'Suffolk County Council commits to continuing its work and partnerships to eliminate knife crime across Suffolk.

It is widely recognised that improving safety for the residents of Suffolk can only be achieved on a collective basis. Therefore, the Council thanks its staff, members and partners on Suffolk's District and Borough Councils, Suffolk Police and Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner, and Probation and Health services for the vital work they all do.

The Council also thanks Suffolk's communities and acknowledges the vital role they play in tackling this issue, particularly by raising awareness among young people across the county.

The Council commends Suffolk Constabulary on its continued efforts to reduce knife crime following the release of data by the Office for National Statistics (ONS), which showed a 38% reduction in crimes across Suffolk involving a knife between June 2022 and June 2024. However, the Council recognises enforcement is only part of the solution.

Therefore the Council asks that, through their chairmanship of the Safer Stronger Communities Board, the Cabinet Member for Environment, Communities and Equality table an agenda item for the next meeting of the Board, scheduled for March 2025, to build on the work already being delivered in Suffolk and investigate the benefits of piloting a knife crime action plan in Ipswich, given the continued concerns raised by residents and councillors in the town.'



North Haverhill Community Update

CGI of the proposed Local Centre within Phase 3A

December 2024

Persimmon Homes Suffolk has been working to bring forward the latest phases of the Boyton Place community at North Haverhill over the autumn months while also carrying out improvements to existing phases.

An application has been submitted for Phase 3A which includes the **Local Centre and 83 new homes**, as well as Phases 5A and 5C which will bring a further **112 homes.**

Landscapers have been auditing trees and creating a schedule for replanting those that have not taken or been vandalised. Work has already started planting and staking trees around the play area, and further tree planting will take place in January.

Designs for the raised tables and dropped kerbs in Ann Suckling Road have been submitted to Suffolk County Council Highways for approval and once approved, work can start immediately.

Farrant Road surfacing works were delayed due to a change in specification from Highways. This work is now scheduled to take place in the new year. Residents will be warned in advance and we advise checking our website for information.

Haverhill Relief Road

Cadent's extensive gas main diversion works have progressed well and are expected to finish in **mid January 2025**. Persimmon Homes Suffolk has been in discussion with Cadent to explore the possibility of **remobilising groundwork contractors** whilst they finish commissioning the diverted gas main.

All works need to be done under Cadent's supervision and will include:

 Completing the tie in of the Relief Road to Hales Barn Road roundabout

 Constructing the culvert and roadway across the ditch.

These works require Minor Works Agreements which are being finalised with Suffolk County Council and we aim to start in January.

The remaining works will be completed once Cadent have finished on site, with the aim of finishing the road in spring.

Landscaping works along the relief road are also scheduled to take place from early January.





Communal spaces

Existing play areas

Sadly, the play equipment has again been targeted by vandals. Persimmon is arranging for the equipment to be replaced and will cover this cost. However, if these acts of vandalism, which has also seen trees damaged, continues the cost may have to come from management fees in the future.

The area surrounding the play park has recently been subject to a strim and thistle clear. Landscape contractors will continue to attend the park to cut the grass and strim as appropriate.

Replacement landscaping is underway now and the raised areas where the grass has not taken will be rotovated and reseeded in spring next year.

A schedule has been agreed with the on-site team to regularly check and empty the bins, along with a litter pick as and when required.

Allotments

A request for a tender for ground works for the delivery of the allotments adjacent to Ann Suckling Road has gone out and work will commence in the coming months to allow for delivery in summer 2025.

The intention is for West Suffolk Council to adopt the allotments and establish an Allotment Association.

Wildflower Meadow

Wildflower seeds have been planted across the development, and while these may not look as aesthetically pleasing at this stage, in time they will form an attractive part of the open space.

The weeds we have growing create competition for the wild grasses and flowers but will die off, making way for more attractive growth.

We are exploring the possibility of installing information boards to explain the various types of wildflower meadows and the nature and wildlife benefits that they provide.

Waste bins

Two dog waste bins are due to be installed, one in the open space by the play area and second within the open space next to Farrant Road.

We have experienced delays in the delivery of the bins from our supplier but we are hoping to have them installed in December.

In the meantime we would kindly ask that residents dispose of their dog waste themselves.

A regime is being put in place to ensure that the bins and dog waste bins will be regularly emptied.

Road sweeping and site hours

We would like to apologise for the muddy road conditions along Ann Suckling Road. We have committed to sweeping this more frequently and reminded contractors and deliveries that they should access the site via the relief road to the north.

We can also confirm there will be no further working on Sundays.



Community workshops

Persimmon Homes Suffolk is aware of the growing need for a local centre at North Haverhill and we are keen to bring forward this exciting mixed-use development that will be a focal point for the community.

A series of workshops were held with Haverhill Town Council and West Suffolk Council which have shaped the current and up and coming phases of the development.

Phases 5A and 5C

- Reserved Matters application submitted to West Suffolk Council in July for 112 new homes
- 34 homes for shared ownership or below market rent
- O Minor amendments made following initial consultations
- Targeting Reserved Matters approval in January 2025.

Potential operators have expressed an interest in the supermarket unit and we hope to be in a position to announce a development partner by spring 2025.

Phase 3A

- Reserved Matters application is live and consultation process underway
- Striking Local Centre building comprising a supermarket and two further commercial units
- O Apartments above the commercial units
- Paved plaza to the front with seating for the community
- 83 homes including 26 for below market value rent and shared ownership
- Trageting Reserved Matters approval in February 2025 with a start on site planned for late summer/autumn 2025.



New play areas proposed


Two further play areas will be delivered for the community during 2025. Equipment is due to be installed during the early part of the year, with landscaping to follow before the end of the current planting season.

The first will be a **large play** and **Multi Use Games Area** (MUGA) to the west of Phase 2a.

- ② Fenced off area for basketball and football games
- 10 pieces of play equipment for all ages including a see-saw and an accessible roundabout and swing
- 📀 Picnic benches.

The second will feature **gym trail equipment** and will be located to the west of Phase 6.

- 8 pieces of play equipment including swings, see-saw with additional logs and boulders for natural play
- O Picnic benches
- 3 pieces of gym trail equipment an exercise bike, cross trainer and multi-fitness frame for body weight exercises.

APPENDIX 2 – Town Councillor's report Councillor John Burns

- **Great Wilsey Park:** Work has been ongoing at Chalkstone Way roundabout to bring up to adoptable standards so that the new TRO for the estate can be implemented. SCC were planning to implement enforcement when they have no responsibility for the land until I pointed this out.
- **Police Matters:** Crime stats for October 2024 were distributed on 2nd December. The latest edition of Constable's County was sent out as a link on 10th December.
- SCC Highways: It will be seen from Cllr Mason's report that my efforts over the past 3 years in trying to convince SCC that they were wrong to assume that the traffic movement TRO for the High Street, Peas Market Hill and Queen Street had been cancelled in 2019 (without any consultation) has finally been met with success. Although we still have to wait until the next financial year, I am hopeful that the signage will be put right both in the town centre and outside the Leisure Centre so that enforcement can be carried out by the police and hopefully CPE will step up to the mark as well.
- Combined Authority: No further updates.
- Greater Cambridge Partnership: No further updates.
- **Parking:** Apologies but have not had time to collate the parking stats I received as result of a FOI request. I have put in my diary to do between Xmas and New Year after filming and editing for panto has been completed.
- **Markets:** I still have had no response to my request from the WSC Portfolio Holder as to what progress has been made as reported in October's report.
- Sturmer Arches: Still nothing to report.
- Fox PH (Wratting Road): No further news known.
- Vixen PH (Millfields Way): No further news known.
- Strasbourg Square: I reported the lights on the shops and alleyways being out and WSC Customer Services disputed their problem but after pointing out they owned the building I am hopeful this will be resolved soon as I went direct to the Property Manager instead.
